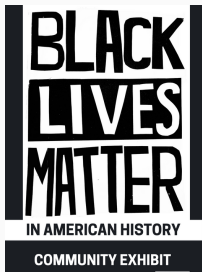

Every year March
is designated
Women's History
Month to celebrate
women's contributions
in American history.

Women's History Month began when the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County (CA) planned and executed a "Women's History Week" celebration in 1978. The organizers selected the week of March 8 to correspond with International Women's Day. The movement spread across the country as other communities initiated their own Women's History Week celebrations the following year. In February 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the Week of March 8th 1980 as National Women's History Week.

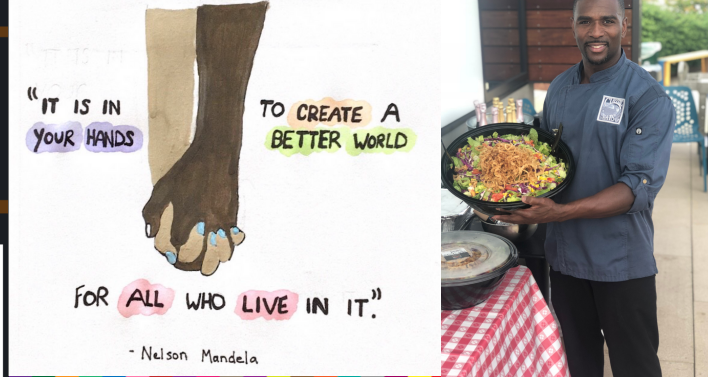
BLACK HISTORY MONTH

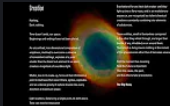
